Key indicator 1: Increase confidence, knowledge and skills of all staff in teaching PE and sport	Key indicator 1: The PPP PE scheme was significantly enhanced through comprehensive staff training and support from the Sports Coach. As a result of this initiative, staff sought advice and support, leading to a more cohesive implementation of the scheme. Whole School CPD was undertaken in collaboration with the Sports Link Governor, Chance to Shine Cricket, and the school's Sports Leader. Consequently, teachers received additional CPD in specific sports such as invasion games and gymnastics. This targeted training resulted in increased confidence among staff. All teachers received 'on-the-job' training during the Chance to Shine cricket sessions delivered by a specialist teacher. This upskilling of Loxdale teachers, who actively participated in the	Overall last year's spend enabled us to work towards improving standards linked to the key indicators. 	session, further contributed to their professional development. As a result, staff felt that their confidence increased significantly. An external PE Deep Dive by TT Education corroborated that PE was a strength within the school. The Sports Leader presented to Governors regarding the confidence, knowledge, and skills of all staff in teaching PE and sport. This was communicated both in written form and during governor meetings. The Link Governor for PE took an active role in the school, providing detailed feedback that highlighted the ongoing improvements and successes of the PE scheme.

As a result of this targeted approach, teaching staff collaborated closely with the Sports Coach to support key children effectively. Children participating in swimming lessons were also strategically grouped. Consequently, the school identified children for the	

'Water Safety Programme' during the summer term, ensuring they received essential safety training in conjunction with ConnectEd. The Sports Coach led bespoke PE activities during lunchtime, dedicating 30 minutes each for KS1 and KS2. These activities. including handball, basketball, and multi-sports, provided varied physical engagement opportunities. As a result, pupils benefited from structured and enjoyable physical activities. Looking ahead, the school is excited to aim for the Platinum Mark in 2025, demonstrating its commitment to continuous **Kev indicator 3:** improvement and excellence in PF. **Key indicator 3**: The profile of PE and sport is raised across the school as a The school successfully maintained the Gold Mark for PE, tool for whole school improvement showcasing its dedication to high-quality physical education. This achievement highlighted the hard work of the entire school community. Pupils from diverse groups, including those eligible for Pupil Premium (PP), girls, and those with identified Special Educational Needs and Disabilities (SEND), represented the school in various out-of-school activities such as cross-country and football. This inclusive approach broadened participation and representation. Pupil voice, gathered via the School Council, highlighted a preference for an after-school club. Consequently, basketball was offered, aligning with pupils' interests and requests. This initiative fostered a sense of ownership and responsiveness to pupil feedback. The Football Festival was meticulously planned and executed as an intra-school football tournament in celebration of England reaching the finals of the Euros. This event not only promoted sport but also provided valuable opportunities for children within the school to participate in competitive football. Play leaders continued to have an active role in daily school life, especially at lunchtimes for EY/KS1 and KS2 pupils, offering a range of activities. Consequently, this enriched the pupils' lunchtime experience and encouraged active participation. The Sports Leader attended learning community meetings, LA CPD, and had regular meetings with the Link Governor. External corroboration came through a 'deep dive' in PE conducted by TT Education, further validating the school's strengths in PE. Moreover, the Sports Coach, supported by the Link Governor, had the opportunity to team teach, enhancing the quality of PE instruction. Additionally, the Sports Coach participated in courses, furthering their professional development.

	Sporting news and achievements were shared regularly in the school and LA newsletters, ensuring the community stayed informed and engaged with the school's sporting successes.

The popularity of our after-school sports clubs was evident, with all clubs having a waiting list, demonstrating high student engagement and interest.	
	The dance program at OSWBA allowed pupils to perform alongside secondary-aged students, fostering collaboration and skill development.	
	The karate club provided students with discipline and physical fitness, while our partnership with AFC Wolves offered development and training squads. As a result, several players had the opportunity to access grassroots football training outside of school hours, enhancing their skills and passion for the sport.	
	The Euro tournament was a significant event, celebrating football and providing competitive opportunities for our students. Additionally, our girls' football sessions during lunch were a great success, promoting inclusivity and encouraging more girls to participate in sports.
